## Three Worship Services Scheduled for Christmas Eve

At 5:00 p.m., a family-oriented Christmas Eve Service will be held in the Sanctuary. Children of all ages are invited to share in the nativity drama by participating as shepherds, sheep, wise people and angels to welcome the Holy Family. No rehearsal is planned for the drama; however, children wishing to participate are asked to come to the Chapel at 4:30 p.m. on Christmas Eve to select their costumes and receive brief instructions.

Modern Worship Candlelight Christmas Eve Service will be held at 7:00 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall. Instead of "rockin'" around the Christmas tree on Christmas Eve, come and "rock" a little bit with us. Our band will be lead in the singing of many of our traditional Christmas Carols, with a little 'modern' flavor. We will experience the Christmas story once again with fresh eyes and open hearts. Join us and bring your friends as we gather to usher the birth of the Christ Child into our lives.

Then, much later in the evening, our final Christmas Eve worship service will be held in the Sanctuary at 11:00 p.m. This service, which concludes Christmas Eve and takes us into Christmas Day, will be a service of traditional carols, anthems by the Chancel Choir, Holy Communion and candle-lighting.



## 2010 Financial Campaign Update

Through Sunday, December 6 we have received 182 Commitment Cards for 2010, totaling \$740,546. There are still 233 households who made commitments for 2009 that have not responded for 2010 and in order to underwrite the proposed budget of \$1,810,690 we need to hear from everyone in the congregation. The staff, the Council on Ministries and the Finance Committee have been hard at work at pulling this budget together which currently represents a 3.13% decrease under the 2009 Budget. Given the continuing economic worries it will require all of us to make a commitment in faith and trust to meet our goal. You are asked to mail or bring your Commitment Cards to the church by December 15 so that we can complete our ministry plans for the new year. ## Finance Committee Update

We are in the critical last few weeks of the financial year and need to receive approximately \$240,000 in pledge gifts in December in order to meet our commitments to local agencies and to the General Conference of the United Methodist Church. Through the end of November we have received total sources of \$1,494,981 against total expenses of \$1,561,956 for a net deficit of \$66,975. That deficit has been covered by the Board of Trustees but has to be paid back by year end, so we need everyone to give their best effort toward completing their pledges. Please note that all gifts for 2009 must be received or postmarked no later than December 31<sup>st</sup> in order to count toward this year's budget.

## A WORD FROM THE PASTOR . .



"All right then, the Lord himself will give you the sign. Look! The virgin will conceive a child! She will give birth to a son and will call him Emmanuel (which means 'God is with us')." (Isaiah 7:14)

When a married couple has a baby, husband and wife often spend a great deal of time choosing the child's name. It makes sense. When we had our children, one of the most difficult things we did was to decide what each child would be called.

After all, we thought, the name would be with the child for his/her whole life, and we wanted it to be just right. That process wasn't easy. There were even compromises made between us.

When Mary and Joseph were expecting their first born, they didn't have to spend time worrying about that. God had already selected their child's name. An angel had been sent to them telling them the baby would be called: "Emmanuel."

The angel's declaration was fulfillment of prophecy. Already, in Isaiah, the people of Israel had learned that a virgin would conceive and give birth to a son, who would be called: "God with us."

There are so many names for Jesus in the Scriptures. He is called: the Light of the World, the Lamb of God, the Good Shepherd, the Bread of Life, the Vine, the King of Kings and Lord of

Lords, the Bridegroom, the Son of God, the Son of the Highest, the Messiah, Christ, the Savior, Jesus, the Promised One, Lily of the Valley, Rose of Sharon, and the Bright and Morning Star.

Each of those names reflects a different facet of Jesus' character and helps us understand who He really is. Of all the names that were given to Him, though, none has the potential of bringing more comfort to our hearts than Emmanuel – "God with us."

Both Isaiah and the angel were telling us that the child Mary would bear would be God Himself, coming down to live among us. Scholars tell us that the when the Bible speaks of God dwelling among His people it literally means "He pitched His tent" among us. That is, He came to live right where we do.

That knowledge will warm my heart this Advent and Christmas season. God loves us enough to be willing to pitch His tent with us.

The truth that we are loved by God is something that can never be taken away from us. May that understanding bless you during the holiday season. God bless you.

## “Happiness” Is Here

The newest piece of art acquired by your Art Committee is “Happiness” by Guan Weixing, an innovative watercolorist and one of China’s most admired and collected artists. His artistic achievements are well known throughout China and increasingly so around the world. If you want to see more of Weixing’s works, you must pay a visit to Ambleside Art Gallery at 528 South Elm Street and meet Jackson Mayshark. On May 4, 2005, Guan Weixing exhibited 80 of his paintings at Jackson’s new gallery in Greensboro and proved to be a huge success. Jackson and the artist had been corresponding for some time and had become close friends. Jackson knew his work and also knew that he was neither an ordinary artist, nor an ordinary soul. Guan Weixing’s paintings are like moving poems. And so is his life. He is a Renaissance man whose artistic genius spills into everything he creates and spills out of everything he is. Jackson Mayshark is Mr. Weixing’s US gallery representative which is an extraordinary honor.

Weixing began painting in oil, but watercolor was his first love. He was influenced by great Russian, Swedish and English artists and even American artist, Andrew Wyeth.

The works of these artists display qualities only watercolor can produce, no other medium. The feelings, the elegance and the charm are peculiar to watercolor. And the florid colors, the radiant and enchanting light, the impressive flavor and the water free from inhibition are all like moving poems. They surge the viewer’s heart. Though Guan Weixing “paints with his heart”, the skilled hand of this artist must also be recognized. His ability to achieve such palpable realism with abstracted and layered pools of pigment is a technical feat any viewer can appreciate.

This 10 week study is based on Isaiah 43:10 and explores what it means to not only believe in God but to believe Him. Do you take God at His Word, believing what He has told you, or do you just believe in His existence and the salvation He offers? Beth Moore came face-to-face with this question well into adulthood. At first, her response to God was, "Lord, of course I believe in You. I've believed in You all my life." Over time, the Holy Spirit led her to understand He was saying, "I didn't ask you to believe in Me. I asked you to believe Me." Through studying the lives of Abraham, Moses, and others from Hebrews 11 as examples of persons who believed God, Beth encourages women to deepen their own trust in God and receive a fresh word from Him.

## A Bulgarian Christmas

Bulgaria is well-known for its rich Christmas traditions: the family dinner, sitting around the fireplace and singing carols. Christmas Eve is the biggest celebration on the Bulgarian calendar. Old traditions are still practiced, although pressures from western influences increase and spread with each passing year.

The following history is provided by Nina Blajeva and Bulgarian Christmas websites.

*There are the ancient Roman elements dating from the beginning of Christianity itself. The Bulgarian name for Christmas, Koldea, comes from the Latin holiday, Calendae, the first days of every month which were probably celebrated in the time of the Roman Empire on the Balkans, especially lavishly for the month of January. There are also the traditions coming from the Bulgarian, Slavic and Balkan folklore. Traditionally, Christmas Eve, between midnight to dawn, is the time for caroling called koleduvane, performed by young men going their rounds in groups, singing ritual songs and wishing the families they are visiting health, prosperity and joy. This is the holiday blessing families receive for Christmas and in return, they give holiday-related food items (ritual bread and wine) to the young men.*

*In addition to caroling, an essential part of the traditional Bulgarian Christmas is the holiday meal, Usafh. Since the Advent period leading to Christmas is a Lent period, the holiday meal usually includes only Lenten dishes, such as beans, stuffed cabbage and peppers, pumpkin pie, dried fruits and nuts, as well as a special ritual bread loaf. Hay is placed under the table to symbolize the manger in which baby Jesus was born.*

*Christmas is a vitally important celebration involving all family members, young and old alike. Work is halted in the fields and everyone puts their efforts towards cleaning, cooking and preparing for Christmas Eve. It is believed that if the Christmas Eve celebrations go well, all will go well throughout the year. Many customs are steeped in rich traditions and charming superstitions, complete with elaborate costumes and festive songs. The women of the family arise before daybreak to prepare 12 vegetarian dishes, each representing a month of the year. A holiday round bread, baked with a silver coin inside for luck, is decorated with symbols of all the living creatures in the house. The oldest man in the family breaks the loaf and gives a piece to each member of the family; the one receiving the coin will have a good year. Special walnuts are also given out. If they are good and delicious, the year will be lucky; if the walnut is empty- it will be a bad year.*

*In some regions of Bulgaria, only one gift, from the parents, is given on Christmas Eve. Father Christmas comes on January 1.j*

While our traditions vary, our friends in Bulgaria, as we, open their hearts to charity and concern for the homeless, poor and hungry. With tables filled, laughter and family time shared, the true meaning of Christmas never leaves our minds.
